Accessions to Local Record Offices in 2021Outings

Outings Once again Rowan Fisher organised a varied programme which was well-supported

**Edge Hill 7 May** The first pitched battle of the English Civil War took place in fields between the villages of Kineton and Radway. The Royalists started on the Edge Hill escarpment and Essex's parliamentary forces were gathered in the fields below. Martin Russell, Vice- President, Shipston Local History Society guided us around several key sites. Our starting and finishing point was the Castle Pub on top of Edgehill from which we had a panoramic view of the valley below.

**Birmingham Guinea Gardens and Birmingham Botanical Gardens Thursday 26 May.** This whole day outing focussed on two interesting sites in the leafy suburb of Edgbaston. In the morning Carol Dealey showed us the Edgbaston Guinea Gardens, a collection of Victorian gardens created for the benefit of the shopkeepers and workers from the Jewellery Quarter. These small plots, still beautiful maintained by their occupants in the twenty-first century are reminiscent of the Hill Close Gardens in Warwick. In the afternoon, we walked to the nearby Botanical Gardens. There the Head Gardener led a fascinating tour of this major Birmingham landmark which was founded in 1829.

**Compton Verney Archaeology Saturday 2**<sup>nd</sup> **July.** Hilary Calow a volunteer at Compton Verney showed us some of the interesting landscape and told us about some of the interesting finds (Roman, Anglo-Saxon and Medieval) found in the grounds. Unfortunately, this must have been the wettest day of what was otherwise an extremely dry and hot summer. We had a super tea under the cover of a tent and then viewed the Georgian Chapel - one of the few buildings that Capability Brown designed.

**Middleton Hall Wed 7<sup>th</sup> September.** For over five hundred years this building was one of the homes of the Willoughby family better known for another of their residences Wollaton Hall in Nottingham. The oldest part of the building dates from 1285. In the twentieth century the house was abandoned and fell into disrepair before being restored by the Middleton Hall Trust.

**Christmas Outing: Baddesley Clinton Moated Manor House.** The house was a sanctuary not only for the Ferrers family but also for persecuted Catholics who were hidden from priest hunters in its secret hiding places during the 1590s. Nat Alcock shared the results of his researches into the construction of the building which question some of the currently accepted dates and sequences of the building work. Members then viewed some of the priest holes and admired the lovely Christmas decorations.

Lectures : until October all our lectures were held on Zoom.

Daytime meeting on Saturday 15 January – Emily Bromley told us about the Black Book of Warwick

#### **Evening Lectures:**

Late Medieval Towns in Arden 15<sup>th</sup> February Dr Andrew Watkins discussed the origins, nature and location of towns in the County's northern portion.

**Members' Meeting 15<sup>th</sup> March**: Two members gave short presentations. **'Rokeby Camp, Rugby'**, Christine Howling considered this local example of the 1946 Squatters' Movement. **Warwickshire's Role in the Development of Dog Shows.** Ruth Barbour highlighted the major role played by Warwickshire in the establishment of dog shows from 1859 onwards.

**Sir Roger Newdigate of Arbury 26 April.** Following our AGM, Maria Tauber of Warwick University gave a talk on Sir Roger Newdigate of Arbury during she considered his media engagement and how different types of oral, manuscript and print media helped shape his image and role as MP.

**18th October** Bill Cook told us about **Long Compton in 1944.** He highlighted how different rural life was at that period. He recommended the film **Twenty Four Square Miles** which is available on You Tube which provides a picture of how difficult life in an adjacent area of Oxfordshire was at that time.

**15 November Changing Health Provision in 19th Century Warwickshire: Our chairman,** Dr John Wilmot, shared with us detail from his recent successful PhD thesis in which he considered developments in small towns and rural areas, with a focus on Stratford-upon-Avon and Southam.

### Changes in personnel.

**Richard Chamberlaine-Brothers**, prior to his retirement, compiled the Bilbliography published in the *Warwickshire History* for the last 40 years. This Bibliography is also accessible on our website and now comprises 150 pages. Members of the Committee presented him with a bound copy of the Bibliography at Warwickshire County Record Office. Another bound copy was donated to the Record Office.

**David Paterson** retired from the committee at the AGM due to his increasing involvement with the Historical Association nationally. He remains an active member and provides an important link with Nuneaton.

James Ranahan is standing down as programme Secretary (Lectures). He has maintained our lecture programme during some very difficult times since 2018. We are grateful to him for all his hard work.

## Officer and committee vacancies

**Treasurer:** As yet we have not found a committee member to act as treasurer. Sophie Basi has supported our chairman by 'keeping the books'. We are very grateful to Sophie for the work she has put in to making sure our financial records are maintained correctly

**Programme Secretary (Lectures)** Jim's retirement means that we need a volunteer for this role. Details are on our website.

Committee Members: We have vacancies for at least two additions to the committee.

**Annual Subscriptions:** As can be seen from the Accounts we are beginning to make an annual loss albeit at the moment small. Our subscriptions were last increased in 2017. Clearly costs have increased considerably since then. The present rate of inflation will erode our cash. Our membership has remained steady over the last couple of years but it remains to be seen if that continues.

We continue to communicate via the twice yearly bulletin with our members (thanks to Mairi MacDonald) and more widely via our website and Face Book (Rowan Fisher) and Twitter Jim Ranahan.
