I would be pleased to learn of any such group's research projects. We all know that local history isn't just about talks, but also about active participation in projects.

#### Research news

StratFire project: This is a four-year collaboration between the Stratford Society and Historic England to establish the chronology and extent of reconstruction of buildings in the mediaeval town centre, following the disastrous fires of 1594, 1595 and 1614. Using building analysis, dendrochronology and archival research it is hoped to establish exactly which parts of High and Chapel Streets were affected, the detailed chronology of reconstruction, similarities (or not) in building design and layout, and the status of the families who were faced with the work and costs. ## **Recent publications**

Mike Kingman, *Brickmaking and Brick Building in The Midlands, 1437*-1780 (Brewin Books, 2023), £14.95, ISBN 978-1-85858-758-5. Brick building came to the Midlands in the fifteenth century, its use reflecting prestige among aristocracy and higher clergy. This study explores its wider acceptance, and describes the pattern and volume of a locally distinctive material.

Michael Layton & Androulla Christou-Layton, *Top Secret Warwickshire* (Brewin Books, 2023) £15.95, ISBN 978-1-85858-765-3. This book seeks to uncover the role played by Warwickshire, and those serving and living in Warwickshire, during World War II and the Cold War. Packed with photographs and personal recollections, it is a valuable source of information.

Maggie Payne, *Buntings: Tales from the Till* (Brewin Books, 2023) £7.95, ISBN 978-1-85858-766-0. This book is a recollection of memories from 30 years of service at the well-known family shop, Buntings, in Alcester, and provides the reality of everyday life behind the counter in a busy local store.
